We are delighted to announce that, as of 1 April 2018, Jack Hunt School is now part of the Peterborough Keys Academies Trust, with Longthorpe Primary School, Middleton Primary School, Ravensthorpe Primary School and Thorpe Primary School. As a Multi-Academy Trust, we will work together to unlock children's potential and passion throughout their school career and prepare them for their futures.

Pamela Kilbey, Headteacher of Jack Hunt School, has been appointed as Chief Executive Officer of the Trust for 2 days a week whilst Martin Fry, Headteacher of Ravensthorpe Primary School, will be Primary Lead Headteacher for 1 day a week.

This year's Take Over Day has once again been a great success. Students took on roles at Peterborough Hospital within a range of different departments. Other roles included Accountancy and Business Administration at Moore Stephens; Practicing and Development Assistance at Greenwood Solicitors; Laboratory Technician at Anglian Water and Chief Inspector at Thorpe Wood Police Station. These roles were of great interest to our older students and a chance to get a true insight into potential future careers.

Our most popular external placements, however, was that of the primary schools and getting our students into role reversal, with them doing some teaching and even running the schools in Headteacher positions. Students were provided with a chance to go back to primary schools to take on roles within Key Stage One and Key Stage Two lessons; these ranged from getting active in PE and Super Movers to helping students learn their phonics, reading and getting creative in art and the important task of marking work.

The students all really enjoyed these placements, and took in a lot of what it takes to run a lesson, learning about the way you have to present yourself to the students and how to change the way you talk depending on the age range, and how much patience can be required.

Waqas Shezad was Headteacher of Jack Hunt for the day. He said, 'I really enjoyed the experience, it is a real eye opener, the most challenging part is how many different directions the Headteacher is pulled in; It is like you see the performance on stage, with no idea of the work done behind the scenes' According to Mrs Kilbey 'Waqas was one of the best Headteachers', and will become a great teacher.'

<u>Ski Trip</u>

Another successful ski trip took place during February half term with 25 students from Jack Hunt School along with 22 students from Neale Wade Academy.

The journey took around 24 hours travelling across 6 different countries before ending up at Austria for five days of skiing. Over the five days the students were split into different groups of abilities; to learn, develop and push themselves out of their comfort zone. They all became more and more confident as the week went on, by the end of the second day the group had covered approximately 23 miles.

It wasn't long before the intermediate group was on the full ski park enjoying the jumps, bumps and rails and the advanced students taking on the black run hitting speeds of 60 mph. After such a successful week it was a real highlight seeing the beginners heading up the mountain to experience the spectacular views and test out the big slopes.

This trip was a great opportunity to learn to ski but also a really good opportunity for the students to learn life skills as well. Students showed fantastic teamwork, communication and resilience amongst others skills throughout the whole week.





Key Stage 3 Music Hub Project

Following two previous projects, Peterborough Music Hub was once again back to provide another project aimed at Key Stage 3 students; this time it focused on storyboarding, themes to support composition and lyric-writing skills.

Our students joined with Ken Stimpson School, Nene Park Academy, St. John Fisher School and Thomas Deacon Academy; 30 students from each school, both players and non-players spent half a day a week in workshops to devise, compose, play and perform individual pieces, before joining the other schools involved at an independent location. Each school worked on a couple of pieces that when added together formed the story as a whole.

The goal was to produce original music and lyrics for a children's theatre production; which was then performed as part of the 'rehearsal reading' in front of a group of primary school students at Kingsgate Conference centre.

19 students from Year 9 have spent the past few months, attending the Language Leaders Award; learning skills to help teach primary school children the basics of Spanish and French.


Over the course the students have been learning about structuring the lessons, planning lessons, changing your voice to suit the different students and engaging students through a range of activities.

The next part of the course was to visit to Thorpe Primary School to put their teaching into practice with two Year 4 classes

The students split themselves across 2 subjects teaching 1 class colours in Spanish, ending the session with Simon

Says, getting the children to actively find items of that colour. The second class studying colours and animals in French, using worksheets to complete the task.

On the walk back from Thorpe Primary, the Year 9s were buzzing with excitement from the experience and discussing what they will do on the return visit. A sense of pride was seen across the students.



On Saturday 17 March 2018, Ellie Piccaver, took to the field to race in the English Schools Cross Country Championships, at Temple Newsam Park, Leeds.

Ellie's journey to this level included racing at Peterborough achieving 3rd place, Cambridgeshire achieving 3rd place and then Anglia achieving 19th place. This placed her in the top 8 from Cambridgeshire making her qualify for the English team.

Having achieved a place in the English Schools last year, Ellie's main goal was to better her scores and hit a new personal best; which she successfully achieved running the 4.1km in 19:23 minutes, placing her 210 out of 323 overall in England and 5th out of the 8 in the Cambridgeshire representative.



Ellie said "The overall session has been really good this year, much better than last. I really enjoy meeting everyone as we travelled and stayed over as the Cambridgeshire representative. The Championships are a really nice end to the cross country season."
