CHINA EXCHANGE



After nearly two weeks of amazing challenges and experiences, eighteen students, and four tired members of staff have returned from China with what we hope are memories that will last a lifetime.

The staff and students stayed at the Gold Apple International School in Shanghai for what has been *much* more than just a sightseeing tour. They have worked exceptionally hard preparing and delivering lessons to students at a number of different schools, the Gold Apple

International school, the state-run Pu Xing Middle School and Pu Guang Primary school for children of migrant workers at the other end of Shanghai's economic spectrum. The exchange is integrated with the British Council's 'Connecting Classrooms' initiative, linking schools in different parts of the world. Schools share best teaching practice and resources, observe lessons and teach in each other's schools.

Mr Barwise has been involved with the China Exchange since its inception in 2010 and has seen the project go from strength to strength. Talking about this year's trip he said "The students have worked very hard, enjoyed some wonderful experiences and have been excellent ambassadors for the school. There have been many opportunities for the students to demonstrate their organisation, teaching and leadership skills as well as their enthusiasm for learning about the Chinese culture."

Through their Sports Leadership work and attending lessons, the students gain a real insight into the education system in China as well as experiencing life in one of the world's fastest growing and changing economies. All the students completed a 3-day home stay with Chinese students and their families which gave them the unique experience of living in a Chinese home. Katie Prange, Year 8 really enjoyed her homestay, saying "I got to stay with a family in a rural area, so it was really good to see the contrast between the city and country living. The best bit was going to see the pandas." Whereas Freddie Evans. Year 9 staved with a family in an older part on the outskirts of Shanghai and said "We went into central Shanghai to visit the Aquarium and the Bank which is over 100 floors high."

During the stay Mr Barwise kept everyone back home up-to-date with his blog (in the News Section of the website) as it was a very intense thirteen days with lots of different activities. This year one of the highlights was a Kung Fu lesson led by a teacher who also currently coaches the World number 2 and number 4 champions. Another, for the students, was organising and leading the Sports Festival for 300 local primary school children. They also had the opportunity to try Chinese crafts including Chinese style pottery,



pottery painting and the art of paper cutting. Freddie Evans, Year 9 said "The most challenging part was organizing and running the Sports Festival but it was a real privilege to be picked to be the host, and it was very satisfying because it was so successful."

When asked what they got out of the trip, Katie said "I am more confident and independent" and Freddie said "The trip was really good for my social skills, staying with the family and talking to all the students. I especially loved the responsibility of looking after the younger students and leading a whole class when teaching English."



Year 9 Design & Make Toys for School Children in Africa

As part of their Product Design course, Year 9 Design & Technology students have been producing toys and games for children in Kenya through a project set up by Mr Hargreaves. The toys, designed for 4-12 year old children, range from jigsaw puzzles and ball bearing mazes to toy skittle alleys and pull along toys. Some of the games are designed to be educational such as Akasha Khan's wooden clock face where the numbers are removable to help children learn to tell the time or Thomas Marshall's and Jaidan Chavda's word puzzles which help the children expand their English vocabulary and spelling. Another student, Amanda Tavoraite has made a very attractive owl shaped abacus-like toy to help the children with their maths.



Many of the toys and games made by the Year 9's were sent as part of a shipment which was sent in April and included footballs, second hand shirts and blouses as well as a microscope donated by the Science Department. Jaiden said "It was cool to do something for someone

less fortunate, we had to think about size and shape for shipping." Thomas added "We needed to make sure it was durable and wanted to make it educational but fun". Both girls agreed, saying "It was a really good project to do."



This project has been happening for several years and is part of a larger support programme along with Hemingways Resort in Watamu, Kenya who deliver the donated items. Shipments are sent once or twice a year and Mr Hargreaves visits the schools and villages every other year. Mr Hargreaves said "We can't help everyone but it is good to help some as it has such an amazing impact on these children's lives. They get very excited receiving the donations and get so much pleasure and benefits out of these toys and games. It is also good to make our students think about children in other parts of the world who have so little."

Pledge Student Project picked as being 'Exemplary'

Yr 12 Geographers Enjoy Private Tour of the Eden Project

Local Deaf Blind Artist Inspires Students Leading into Deaf Awareness Week

In recognition of Deaf Awareness Week (19-23 May) students were given a presentation by Deaf Awareness Teaching Assistant Nicki Sanders in House Assemblies on deafness. She talked about how deaf people can enjoy music, the different types of deafness and that whilst hearing aids help, deaf people still have to overcome major issues when using them. Other members of staff including Mrs Larrington, from Learning Support and Mrs McQuillan also took part explaining what it was like being deaf and the type of hearing aids they use.

Students were also inspired by a visit from deaf blind artist (Jamie) Lloyd McCullough who talked about growing up, suffering from Usher's Syndrome and his deteriorating sight. He suffers from night blindness, cannot see facial expressions and what he sees depends on the light around. He used photographs and computer technology to illustrate what he can see. Jamie talked about how recent operations and failing sight has affected his confidence and the way his art has helped him. With a degree in Art, he originally worked in acrylics but his deteriorating sight has meant he increasingly uses computer software packages to paint with. Jamie showcased some of his artwork explaining each piece and how long they take to create. He is currently working on pieces for an exhibition he is doing with Deaf Blind charity Sense, under his professional name Lloyd McCullough. Head of House, Mr Keber said "It was an amazing presentation considering this was the first time Jamie had presented at a secondary school. Jamie was truly inspiring and the students were really impressed

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In the afternoon Jamie demonstrated how he uses computer technology to create his artwork to a group of students from ERHPS (Enhanced Resource Provision for Hearing Support). Student Naima Suge Yr 12 said: "I had no idea that someone who was blind as well as deaf could produce such amazing art! Wow – it blew me away! And the technology he used to make his pictures was incredible. It has really got me thinking that if you really want to achieve success you knock down barriers." Naila Bibi in Year 10, added "I can't believe he is doing such amazing work! It made me so, so happy to see his artwork." Year 11 student, Calum Daly, who is also deaf commented: "I think his artwork is wondrous and amazing. Every time I see it I think 'Wow!' And knowing that he is blind as well as being deaf makes it even more amazing."

"It shows you can do what you want with life even if you have a disability. He was brave to come and present his work in front of people that he couldn't see." Olly Oakley, Yr 8 "He is an inspiration to young adults. He portrayed a message of no matter what don't give up on your dreams" Martynas Sasnauskas, Yr 10. "The art that Jamie did was amazing. I didn't know that someone who was partially blind and deaf could produce such great artwork. He kind of told us not to give up what you are doing and try your best in what you do." Jenis Joy Yr 7
